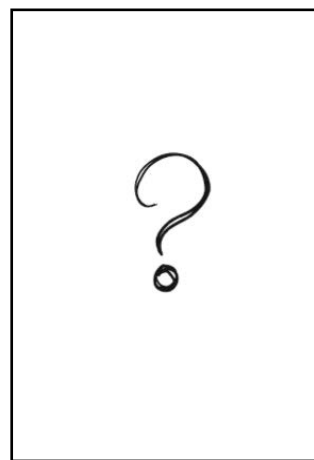

This special Craftsman home belies the history of the land it sits upon; it was not the first to stand on this property. A Victorian home built by gold miner Frank A. Moore once stood within its footprint, and it was one of the first homes to grace the southeast slope of Queen Anne Hill. In 1893, he rented this home to his future wife, Tilla, and her first husband, Seattle firefighter and veteran of the Great Seattle Fire, Harry W. Jones. After Tilla divorced Harry, Frank gifted this home to his longtime renter, Tilla, and one year later, they married. The Craftsman standing today at 606 Lee Street represents a snapshot in time in 1905 when renowned Seattle architect, Henderson Ryan, designed a distinctive Italianate-inspired Seattle Box-style home for Frank and Tilla's new life together. Subsequent homeowners continue this home's fascinating pedigree, including Charles J. E. Blanc, a renowned French chef and proprietor of critically acclaimed establishments such as Maison Blanc and the Rathskeller.

Tilla was the daughter of Washington Territory pioneers George and Matilda Savage. George, who would later live in Seattle with Tilla, was born in London in 1832. When he was 8-years-old, he sailed with his parents to Montreal. He learned his father's trade – watchmaking and silversmithing – and worked in his father's jewelry store after they moved to Guelph, Ontario, in 1848. In 1859, George married Matilda Trim, and on February 11, 1860, they welcomed firstborn Matilda whom they called Tilla/Tillie.

In 1862, George sailed to the Pacific coast via Panama, settled in Walla Walla, and sent for his wife and daughter. Tilla and her family experienced a tumultuous life in the fledgling Territory. George ran a jewelry and watchmaker business, but he was away for stretches of time trying his luck at gold mining. In 1869, after little to no success, he focused again on his jewelry business. In 1873, Tilla's mother died of tuberculosis, leaving 12-year-old Tilla and three younger siblings (her 11-month-old sister died the year before). George remarried in 1875, and after the bank foreclosed on the family home, he acquired 240 acres in Walla Walla County through the Homestead Act. Then in 1886, the family's new home burned down.

At some point, Tilla met Harry W. Jones, an Iowan born in 1858, and they married in Walla Walla on March 19, 1884. By October 1888, the couple had moved to Seattle; that is when Tilla paid \$650 for lots 7 and 8 in Block B of Nob Hill Addition. The lots were on the southeast corner of Lombard Street (Sixth Avenue North) and Payne Street (Lee Street). It seems Tilla and Harry did not build a home there right away; in 1889, they lived in a residence at the foot of Bell Street. Two years later, the directory listed Tilla and Frank's address as the southeast corner of Payne and Lombard Streets.

In 1889, Harry was a teamster for Schwabacher Brothers and a volunteer fire fighter who fought The Great Seattle Fire that June. Months after the calamity, city commissioners hired its first paid firefighting crew, for which Harry was an engine driver for Fire Company No. 2, located on 3rd and Pine Street. An 1890 Seattle Post-Intelligencer article stated, "Almost with out exception the new firemen are old hands and veterans at the business..." and listed several men, including Harry Jones, who "were volunteers in the old No. 4 in Seattle."

In 1893, Tilla and Harry moved across the street to a four-year-old Victorian home their neighbor, Frank Moore, had built in 1889. The outline of both houses can be spotted on the 1891 map, Birds Eye View Seattle and Environs.

Frank A. Moore was born in February 1848 in Tennessee to William Moore and Elizabeth (Stone) Moore. His timeline jumps to November 1889 when he paid \$3,000 to Seattle lawyer G. A. Hill for Lots 1-4 in Block C of Nob Hill Addition. Weeks later, Frank applied for a permit to build a one-story home on Lot 1, estimated to cost \$600. It was one of the highest homes on the Hill; the North Seattle Cable Railway wouldn't extend service to the top of Queen Anne until 1891. In 1890, Seattle's Polk Directory listed Moore's address as "Lombard n e cor Payne." Between 1893 and 1897, the home's address was 1404 Lombard Street, and until 1905, it was 1404 6th Avenue North.

He wasn't home much. He was listed as a miner in the 1890 directory, and as Seattle was known as the "Gateway to the Yukon," it made sense that Seattle was his home base or at least a place to have an investment property. According to family lore, Frank mined during the Klondike Gold Rush, and a newspaper described him as an Alaskan pioneer. Records showed him in Canada's Yukon Territory, but he mostly mined in the Tolovana River Valley, a remote area northwest of Fairbanks, Alaska.

In 1893, Frank rented his home to Tilla and Harry. Soon after, the couple welcomed their only child, a son named Ashley Carlton. He attended Mercer Grammar School just down the hill on 4th Avenue North and Valley Street. It was an 8-room building that opened in 1890 and received a four-room addition in 1892. Mercer was considered Seattle's finest school and was included in Seattle's exhibit at the International Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893 to showcase Seattle's modern educational facilities.

Harry continued to work exclusively for the fire department. From 1894 to 1900, he was a driver for Fire Company No. 4 on 4th and Battery Street. The job took its toll; in June 1899, the *Seattle Daily Times* declared Civil Service Commissioners had "approved the disability claim of Harry Jones, driver of No. 4 engine."

The year his claim was approved, Harry applied for two permits to build on his and Tilla's rental property. An April permit allowed the construction of a 20' x 26'

addition, and a November permit was for a shed. Harry and Tilla's living conditions may have improved, but their marriage was and had always been troubled. The *Seattle Post-Intelligencer* reported on July 27, 1902:

Tilla S. Jones was granted a divorce from Harry W. Jones yesterday afternoon by Judge Bell, and the custody of the child, Ashley, was awarded to the mother. The Joneses were married at Walla Walla March 19, 1884, but have lived in a state of "continual quarreling" ever since, and both appeared pleased when the legal separation was granted.

One month after the divorce, Frank was in the Yukon when on August 26, 1902, he gifted his Victorian to Tilla. The deed articulated that the property "being intended by grantor to make grantee a gift of said property as her sole and separate property. That grantor is financially able to make such a gift and is not defrauding any creditor by so doing..."

Two months after the divorce, Tilla's father George, who was suffering from tuberculosis, recorded in his diary that he had moved in with Tilla and Ashley on September 19, 1902.

It's impossible to know how much time Frank spent in Seattle, but he was there on October 21, 1903; that is when he and Tilla were married. In December, Tilla, Frank, Ashley, and George took a train from Seattle to Southern California for George to receive medical care. But just as tuberculosis had taken Tilla's mother 31 years before, George succumbed to the disease in April 1904. He had a \$2,500 life insurance policy in which he instructed \$1,000 to be given to each of his two daughters and \$250 to each of his two sons.

A fresh start was in order for Tilla, Frank, and Ashley. First, Ashley officially gained a new dad when Frank adopted him – and all three got a new house. The building process seemed to have been largely steered by Tilla. Architect Henderson Ryan was hired to design a modern home. Ryan had already submitted his plans to the City of Seattle when Tilla applied for a building permit on November 4, 1905. The permit read: "Permission is hereby requested by Mrs. F. A. Moore to build at No. 606 Lee St." It would be a 2-story frame residence measuring 36 x 34, estimated to cost \$4,000. Henderson Ryan lived in the

neighborhood at 1713 3rd Avenue North and the home's contractor, James Hamilton, also lived nearby at 1801 4th Avenue North.

Henderson Ryan was born in Morgan County, Alabama, in 1856 and attended the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky (now the University of Kentucky) between 1873 and 1877. Between 1893 and 1894, Henderson worked with architect Herman Hadley on the Richardsonian "Old Central," the first building on the campus of Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical College (now Oklahoma State University). Henderson moved to Seattle in 1898 and was a contractor for two years before branding himself an architect.

Ryan's first commissions were residential. Unfortunately, most of his designs fell to city expansion. One of his Craftsman homes still stands on Capitol Hill – the G. W. Cline House at 1422 East Aloha Street, which was built months before 606 Lee Street and shares similarities. Ryan's professional breakthrough may have been the Ballard Library, completed in early 1904. Afterward, he received a flurry of commissions: the Swedish Baptist Church at 9th and Pine Street; The Glencoe, apartments at 1511 Boylston Ave; The Roycroft, apartments at 317 Harvard Avenue East; and the now-demolished Waldorf Building, the largest apartment building in Seattle at the time.

Diana James, author of *Shared Walls*, wrote about the Waldorf's novel feature:

Each of the apartments is to be equipped with a peculiar device, an idea of Mr. Ryan (the Waldorf's architect), for house cleaning, so arranged that any occupant of any apartment, by the simple attachment of a short rubber hose, can clean the apartment with compressed air in a few minutes' time, driving all dust to the basement and eliminating the necessity of sweeping. This is a feature that so far as known has never been installed in any other similar building ever constructed.

Ryan began to specialize in designing motion picture theaters since films were being viewed in remodeled vaudeville theaters. In 1914, his lavish Liberty Theater across from the Pike Place Market featured ornate grillwork for the city's first Wurlitzer Organ. Ryan patented a novel ramp design that provided easy balcony access while maximizing auditorium space.

In early 1905, a reporter at the *Seattle Daily Times* disclosed that Henderson Ryan had “a half million dollars’ worth of work under way this spring. This includes a number of expensive residences. Mr. Ryan finds that the most expensive homes of all are being built on Queen Anne Hill, but the greater number of fine homes are going up in Capitol Hill.”

Frank and Tilla’s Victorian home was soon demolished, and the Italianate-inspired Seattle Box style home was born. Just as their lives bridged the Victorian and the Arts & Crafts era, this home artfully blended ornate trimmings reminiscent of the Victorian era with the modern sensibilities of the Craftsman era. The Seattle Box style’s signature element – oriel windows – can be seen on the home’s second level. These windows, along with the home’s deep, bracketed eaves, and the sets of classically-inspired arched windows impart an exotic air that is emblematic of Henderson Ryan’s style.

Tilla showed off her distinctive new home by hosting many guests. She hosted meetings for the Daughters of Pioneers Club, and her cousin Anne Mitchell lived in the home in at least 1909. A stenographer, Lois Bowman, also lived in the home from at least 1913 to 1916.

Ashley attended Queen Anne High School. He loved theater and was the school’s stage manager for every school play. After Ashley graduated in 1915, he clerked at a department store. Sadly, an unknown condition precipitated a fatal case of myocarditis. So when Ashley died on August 11, 1921, Tilla’s world turned upside down. Months later, in March 1922, she sold her beloved home to Marie Louise Blanc, wife of restaurateur Charles J. E. Blanc, and around 1925, she moved to Alaska. Tilla died in Tolovana on June 21, 1929, and Frank died in Fairbanks in 1936.

When Marie and Charles bought 606 Lee Street in 1922, the transformative age of the Roaring Twenties was in full bloom. Charles, a chef and restaurateur, had just been granted a cabaret license for his latest venture, Chantecler Blanc's. It was in a former roller skating rink at 311 University Street and was a cafeteria by day and a cabaret and dance hall by night. In the fall of 1923, he held six weeks of popular dance contests. The establishment's first house band, Tiny Burnett's, played during the day and at night; their music was sometimes broadcast on the *Seattle Post-Intelligencer* radio station, KFJC.

Charles Joseph Ernest Blanc was born on April 28, 1881. He received his chef's training in Paris and worked in several countries before moving to Seattle. He purchased the Stacy Mansion, built in 1883 on 3rd and Marion, and there he opened his longest running restaurant, Maison Blanc. Hattie Graham Horrocks wrote Charles Blanc's biography in *Restaurants of Seattle 1853-1960*:

Charles Joseph Blanc, who had received his training as a chef in the old country, came to the United States in 1900 to ply his trade in the Western World. He worked for a time in New York City, then crossed the U. S. to San Francisco to become chef for a restaurant there, but by 1906, he had arrived in Seattle and soon became chef at the recently opened New Washington Hotel. Having decided to permanently locate in Seattle, he bought the Martin Stacy Mansion, built in 1883. While on a trip to Europe, he married in Paris and brought his bride to reside in the mansion. He started his restaurant

business across the street from his home at 308 Marion Street in 1916. He operated several other restaurants in Seattle in the meantime, one, which he named The Chanticleer [sic], was located where the Northern Life Tower now stands; another was located across the street from the County-City Building in the Morrison Hotel. The Chanticleer [sic] was a favorite dining place for many of our Seattleites until it went out of business when the Tower was built on the site. He decided to move the Marion Street restaurant to the mansion and, also, to maintain his living quarters there. For many years, Maison Blanc was a showplace as well as an unusually fine place to dine. While enjoying the best of service and cuisine, guests were seated in an art collector's treasury, where objects of art brought from all over the world as well as valuable pictures, which adorned the walls, added much to the pleasure of the diners. Tourists from distant lands were always directed to Maison Blanc's and our own Seattleites were some of the regular customers. Blanc maintained his Rathskeller on the lower level. Charles Blanc, known far and wide as a famous chef and restaurateur, passed away on January 16, 1955 in his apartment in the mansion at age 73. Mrs. Blanc had died earlier and left their daughter to the care of Mrs. Marie Peck, who had managed Maison Blanc's for several years before the death of Mr. Blanc. The business was turned over to a new management in 1957. The art objects and the fine furnishings had been removed by the family before that date and how fortunate that was because the mansion burned on April 30, 1960.

In March 1926, Marie was pregnant with her and Charles's first child (Marie Louise) when she sold 606 Lee Street to Eugene and Leonora Hartshorne, and she and Charles moved to their apartment at Stacy Mansion. Sadly, Marie died that August a few hours after giving birth. A few months later, Charles closed Chantecler and focused on his restaurants, especially his jewel, Maison Blanc. A 1935 advertisement declared: "Charles J. E. Blanc is surely a man with the soul of an artist—none other could achieve such high accomplishment in the Art de Cuisine. That he has achieved a position of real distinction is indicated by the international recognition of his Maison Blanc as having place among leading restaurants of the world...Famous canvases, objet d'art and antiques from all over the world make the interior of this famous old Seattle landmark as



intriguing as its exterior

Eugene and Leonora Hartshorne



Eugene Charles Hartshorne was born to farmers on March 10, 1890, in Thayer, Kansas. He and his family moved to Virginia before settling in Oklahoma. In 1913, Eugene was an electrical engineer and was hired by the U.S. Government to be a canal operator at the Panama Canal, which opened in 1914. He lived in Balboa, a district of Panama City located at the entrance to the Canal.

Leonora Evelyn Breneman (sometimes spelled “Brenneman”) was born on September 19, 1896, in East Hopewell, York, Pennsylvania. She graduated from high school in 1914 and attended nursing school before working as a nurse at a hospital in Ancon, Pennsylvania.

Eugene and Leonora married in York, Pennsylvania, on December 13, 1922. The couple lived in Panama until about 1925 when a ship manifest listed the couple on a boat sailing from Balboa to San Francisco. Eugene and Leonora ended up in Seattle; they were first listed in Seattle’s 1926 directory, the year they purchased 606 Lee Street from Charles and Marie Blanc.

Leonora worked as a nurse at a clinic, and Eugene was co-owner of the Twentieth Century Top Shop, an automobile top business. They didn't live at 606 Lee Street for long. In February 1927, the couple placed a rental ad in the *Seattle Daily Times*: "6 rooms and a double garage; strictly modern throughout; the interior finish is unusual; view; North or East Queen Anne car." The directory that year listed them at 1416 6th Avenue North.

Eugene and Leonora soon returned to Panama and rented 606 Lee Street to various tenants for almost 25 years. Ship manifests revealed they sailed between Balboa and the United States every few years, but they didn't return to 606 Lee Street until 1950 when 60-year-old Eugene got a job with Boeing Aircraft Company as an electrical engineer. He retired around 1958 and died in 1967. Leonora died in August 1977.

George and Arlys Osborne began this home's third chapter in 1977. They stand out as this unique Craftsman's longest occupants, and they are thoughtful caretakers. Their curiosity uncovered this home's fascinating tale that includes gold rushes; the Great Seattle Fire; love lost and love found; renowned French restaurants; and the opening of the Panama Canal. Subsequent families will add their stories too, but this delightful home stands as a tribute to pioneers Tilla (Savage Jones) Moore and Frank Moore.

Lots Seven (7) and Eight (8), Block "B" Nob Hill Addition to the City of Seattle.




MORE GOOD FIREMEN.

Additional Men for the Paid Department.

COMPANIES NEARLY ALL FILLED.

William T. Rogers Made Assistant Chief
 --"Three's" Move Into the Main Street House.

Chief Kellogg yesterday completed his list of recommendations of men to fill the positions in the fire department, made necessary by the addition of new companies to occupy the new engine-houses just completed. He also recommended the appointment of a successor to Assistant Chief Bassler, resigned, and he also promoted and changed the positions of several of the old firemen.

The report submitted to the council at its meeting last evening by the chief was as follows:

SEATTLE, July 11, 1890.

Hon. Mayor and City Council: At request of your committee on fire and water, I have attended to the matter of lighting in the new engine-houses and inclose bids from the Seattle Gas Company, and from the Pacific Electric Light Company. I am informed by the superintendent of the Seattle Electric Light Company, that at this time they can only light the Main street houses. This they can do immediately. The Seattle Electric Light Company charge \$1.50 per light, with 15 per cent off and a charge of \$2 for each light for wiring and insulation. The bids from the gas and electric light companies please find inclosed.

I also submit for your approval the following names to complete the organization of Engine Company No. 4, and for the company to be located at the Main street station and the truck company at the Battery street station. This number will put in service all the apparatus now available. When repairs to No 2 are completed a company will have to be formed for that engine, which cannot be done until the Pine street station is completed and engine No. 2 is ready for service. Kelleher, Thomas Gillis, Charles Magill, Fred Wilbur, Harry Jones, Charles Haight, J. L. Nelson, Charles Murray, Richard Doubledede, James Latham and James J. Lynch. These nominations were confirmed by the council last night.

Almost without exception the new firemen are old hands and veterans at the business, and many of them have held high and responsible positions in other paid and volunteer departments in the East. Michael Breslin, who formerly belonged to the St. Louis department, has a national reputation among firemen as the best and most daring truckman in the United States. He has saved scores of lives, and is said to not know what fear is. M. F. Kelleher was nine years in the department of St. Paul, five of which he was assistant chief. Paul Brasted belonged to the paid department in Chicago, H. J. Malone, Thomas Gillis, Harry Jones, Charles Murray and William Hearn were volunteers in the old No. 4 in Seattle. Henry Hale is also well known in Seattle as an old volunteer. Michael Mayonck came from a Dakota department, Charles Magill from Troy, N. Y., Joseph Latham and James Lynch from the Philadelphia department, and J. L. Nelson was a sailor, and is an agile ladder climber.

The old central station on University street was very much in confusion all day yesterday. New men were coming in and the old ones were gathering up their possessions and getting ready to move to the new engine-houses.

Lieutenant Wallace, of the hook and ladder company, who has been acting captain for the past ten days, was made captain of No. 3 engine company, and he assumed his new duties at the Main street house last night. He will have seven of the new men in his company.

Captain Hunt, of No. 1, will for the present stay at central with a hose company, and his engine will go to No. 4, on Battery street.

Captain Clark will stay at headquarters with No. 2.

Captain Allen will be at No. 4 with No. 1 engine, until the old No. 2 Gould engine now in the shop is repaired.

M. F. Kelleher will be captain of Hook and Ladder Company No. 2, stationed at headquarters.

Thomas Gallaher will be captain of No. 1 hook and ladder at Battery street.

The fire department of Seattle now consists of forty-nine men, divided as follows: Engine Company No. 1, 4 men; Engine Company No. 2, 8 men; Engine Company No. 3, 8 men; Engine Company No. 4, 8 men; Hook and Ladder Company No. 1, 8 men; Hook and Ladder Company No. 2, 8 men; Chemical No. 1, 4 men; the chief, the assistant chief and the superintendent of the fire alarm system. As soon as the Pine street engine-house is completed four more men will be required, and this will equip all of the apparatus belonging to the department.

"If the old Gould engine was done," said Chief Kellogg yesterday, "which has been at the shops now for six weeks receiving a little repairing, we could turn out the four engines at once—something we have never before been able to do. I hope that the engine will be soon repaired, for we need it very much now that our reserve engine here has to go to No. 4."

Assistant Chief Bassler stepped down and out yesterday noon, and was succeeded by Mr. Rogers. Mr. Bassler had a hard time getting away from "the boys," and in the universal hand-shaking and the good wishes exchanged between the ex-officer and his men, more than one tear stole out over the browned cheeks of the firemen. As Chief Kellogg bid Mr. Bassler good by, he handed him a letter which read as follows:

Civil Service Decides on a Long List

Dr. P. E. M. Miller Named Last Night to Succeed Titus on the Medical Board.

The Civil Service Commissioners held a meeting last evening and decided on a list of June examinations. These will include several departments of the city government, but will not include the police department or general labor.

The examinations will begin about the 23rd. They will include all classes in the city engineer's department, taking in transitmen, levelers, draughtsmen, computers, head chainmen, rear chainmen, and inspectors of lumber, inspectors of concrete and cement testers, new positions made necessary by the construction work on Cedar River.

In the fire department there will be examinations for marine engineers, stokers, fire engineers, pilots and drivers.

In the library department there will be examinations for forwarder, sitcher in the bindery and for messenger.

In the mechanical engineering there will be an examination for firemen, for pumping stations.

There will also be held an examination for first nurseryman for the park department, a position that will require some technical knowledge and skill in that line.

The Board last night approved the disability claim of Harry Jones, driver of No. 4 engine and disapproved of the claim of Geo. Meiggs of the fire department.

Dr. P. E. M. Miller was elected to membership of the medical board of examiners which has charge of all medical examinations under civil service. He takes the place of Dr. Titus, whose term is out. The charter requires members of different political faith and the Civil Service Board had to do a little investigating before they named the new man. Dr. Miller is a Democrat.

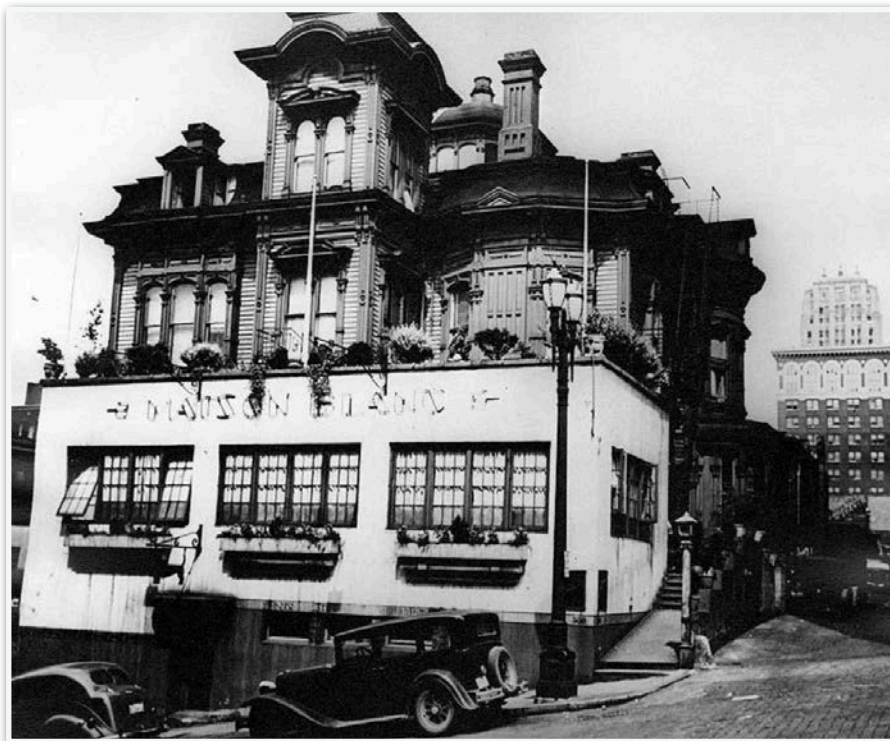

Death Takes Charles Blanc, Restaurateur

Charles J. E. Blanc, 73, proprietor of Le Maison Blanc and a widely known chef, died yesterday at his apartment in the restaurant at 308 Marion St. He had been ill the past two years.

Mr. Blanc was a native of France and received his chef's training in Paris. He cooked in various European countries before he came to the United States about 1900. He came to Seattle in 1906 from San Francisco.

For a number of years Mr. Blanc was chef at the New Washington Hotel, the Rainier Club and other establishments. He opened Le Maison Blanc in 1916 in the former Martin Van Buren Stacy residence, which was erected here in 1883. He also owned and operated several other restaurants.

In 1936 Mr. Blanc was made a chevalier of the Legion of Honor by the French government for his interest in the welfare of the French people in Washington. He founded Le Cercle Francais and was a past president of the Alliance Francaise.

Mr. Blanc was a founder of the Pacific Northwest Chefs de Cuisine Association. He was a member of the National Restaurant Association, the Advertising Club, the Music and Art Foundation, the Washington Athletic Club, and was a life member of the Elks and Eagles. He assisted for many years in Boys' Club work.

Mr. Blanc is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Edmund Coyne, Carmel, Calif., and four grandsons.

Funeral arrangements are being made at the Bonney-Watson mortuary.

Rites for Mrs. Blanc To Take Place Tomorrow

Funeral services for Mrs. Marie Louise Blanc, wife of Charles J. E. Blanc, 508 Marion St., will take place tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock in St. James Cathedral. Mrs. Blanc died last Friday. Pending word from her mother who lives in France, decision to send the body to that country has been delayed. Bonney Watson Undertaking Company is in charge.

C. J. E. BLANC'S WIFE SUCCEUMBS

Joy, darkened by the swift shadow of sorrow, has come into the life of Charles J. E. Blanc.

On Friday, a few hours after the birth of a daughter, his first child, his wife, Marie Louise Blanc, died at the Swedish Hospital. The daughter, doctors say, will live.

Twelve years ago, the widely-known Seattle restaurant man brought his bride from Mas Dieu, France, where she was born thirty-five years ago.

Mrs. Blanc, it is planned, will rest in her native country, where her mother and a sister live. Bonney-Watson Company will announce funeral arrangements later.

A \$298,346.97 estate was left by Charles J. E. Blanc, 73, French-born Seattle restaurateur, who died January 16, it was disclosed yesterday when an estate inventory was filed with County Clerk Norman R. Riddell.

Mr. Blanc, the proprietor of Maison Blanc and The Rathskeller, left the bulk of his estate to his daughter, Mrs. Edmund Coyne, Carmel, Calif.

NEW MOORE BUILDING

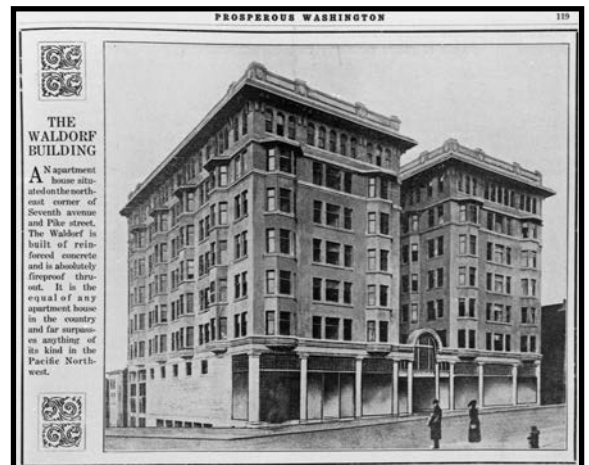
H. Ryan is the architect of this handsome building, which Mr. Moore an Alaskan operator represented in this city by John G. Price of the Northern Securities & Banking Company, is to erect on the east side of Fourth Avenue, near Union Street. The building will be 60x111 feet in size, and will be a seven-story hotel and store structure, with a fine cafe in the basement, also a space for a barber shop and baths in the basement.

On the first floor will be two stores and a hotel lobby, extending through to the rear of the building, thus giving facility for handling trunks, etc., from the alley. On this floor will also be fitted up some fine sample rooms in order to be able to cater to traveling men. There will be twenty-three fine modern hotel rooms on each floor above the first, each having hot and cold water and clothes closet. Some rooms will connect with private baths. The building will probably only be constructed three or four stories high at the present, but there is a possibility that the building may be built thoroughly fireproof and strong enough to carry at least ten stories. Plans will soon be ready for figures.



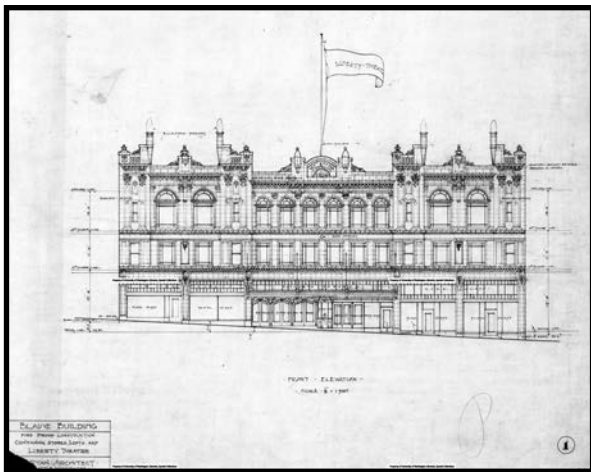
THE ROYCROFT.

This \$45,000 apartment building is being built for E. B. Roy, of Roy & Roy, lumber dealers. It is situated at the northwest corner of Harvard Avenue North and East Thomas Street. The exterior will be of stone and pressed brick, with Roebuck tile roof for the bays. The front entrance will be of marble with a large marble vestibule. The building will be equipped with every modern convenience and appliance, including separate circuit for electric cooking, compressed air apparatus, garbage elevator, etc. Marble & granite will be used in all the apartments, which will be provided with speaking tubes, electric bells, telephones, refrigerators and complete buffet kitchens. The building will be divided into three, four and five-room apartments; thirty-one apartments in all. This will be one of the most modern and up-to-date apartments in America. H. Ryan is the architect.

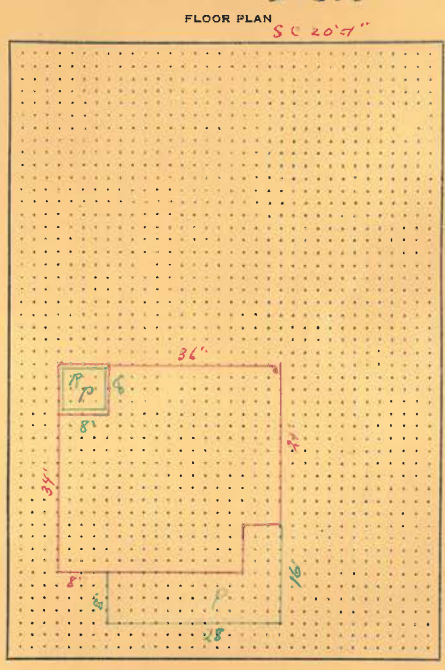
